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Vipul asks:

Babli, what exactly is a romance scam?

Babli explains:

A romance scam happens when someone builds a fake or deceptive relationship to gain your trust and eventually get money, financial information, or another benefit from you. The relationship may feel genuine because the scammer can spend weeks or months building an emotional connection.

BABLI'S ACTION: Treat requests for money separately from feelings of trust.

Vipul asks:

What are the first warning signs I should notice?

Babli explains:

Be cautious when someone becomes intensely affectionate very quickly, tells dramatic personal stories, or pushes for a serious relationship before you really know them. No single behavior proves a scam, but several unusual signs together deserve attention.

BABLI'S ACTION: Slow down relationships that move unusually fast.

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Vipul asks:

What if they always have a reason they can't meet me?

Babli explains:

Repeated excuses can be a warning sign, especially when someone continually avoids meeting or live interaction while claiming a serious relationship. Scammers may create believable explanations involving work, travel, emergencies, or distance.

BABLI'S ACTION: Pay attention to repeated avoidance and changing excuses.

Vipul asks:

Can their photos help me know whether they're real?

Babli explains:

Photos alone are not proof of identity because pictures can be stolen, altered, or generated. If you suspect deception, a reverse-image search may sometimes reveal that a photo appears under another name or on unrelated websites.

BABLI'S ACTION: Don't treat attractive photos as identity verification.

Vipul asks:

When does money usually enter the conversation?

Babli explains:

Often after trust has developed. The person may describe an emergency, travel problem, medical expense, business difficulty, or another reason they urgently need help.

BABLI'S ACTION: Treat unexpected money requests as a major warning sign.

Vipul asks:

What if they promise to pay me back?

Babli explains:

A promise does not make the request safe. Be especially cautious if someone you have never met asks you to send money, cryptocurrency, gift cards, or other difficult-to-recover payments.

BABLI'S ACTION: Don't send money based only on an online relationship or promise.

Vipul asks:

What if they want to send money to me instead?

Babli explains:

That can also be risky. Someone may ask you to receive money, move funds, deposit a check, open an account, or forward a package. You could become involved in fraud or lose your own money.

BABLI'S ACTION: Never move money or packages for an online romantic interest you cannot verify.

Vipul asks:

What if I'm emotionally involved and I'm not sure what to believe?

Babli explains:

Step outside the relationship for a moment and talk to someone you trust. A friend or family member who is not emotionally involved may notice inconsistencies or warning signs more easily.

BABLI'S ACTION: Get an independent opinion before sending anything valuable.

Vipul asks:

What if the person asks for private photos or personal information?

Babli explains:

Be careful. Intimate images and sensitive information can be misused for impersonation, fraud, harassment, or blackmail. Never let threats or embarrassment pressure you into sending money.

BABLI'S ACTION: Protect intimate images, passwords, financial details, and identity information.

Vipul asks:

What should I do if I realize I may have been scammed?

Babli explains:

Stop sending money and preserve messages, payment records, usernames, and other evidence. Contact the payment provider or financial institution involved as quickly as possible and report the account to the platform. Follow the official fraud-reporting process where you live.

BABLI'S ACTION: Stop, save the evidence, contact your financial provider, and report the scam.

Babli's Quick Check

- Watch for someone who:
- Pushes the relationship unusually fast.
- Repeatedly avoids meeting or live verification.
- Has stories or details that do not add up.
- Eventually asks for money or financial help.
- Requests gift cards, cryptocurrency, or unusual payments.
- Wants you to receive or transfer money for them.
- Pressures you to keep the relationship or payments secret.

Simple Rule

Remember

A relationship should not require you to ignore financial warning signs. If an online romance turns into requests for money, slow down and verify who you are dealing with.

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
